
South Asian Heritage Month 2023 – 'Stories to Tell'

Memoirs and non-fiction writing


<u>I Belong Here – Anita Sethi</u>

Hidden Heritage - Fatima Manji


A powerful, essential perspective on British history, exploring how objects and artworks across Britain give view to Britain's historical connection to the Orient.



Cookbooks


<u>Jikoni: Proudly Inauthentic Recipes from an Immigrant Kitchen</u> <u>– Ravinder Bhogal</u>

Ravinder was born in Kenya to Indian parents and moved to London as a child. This cookbook encapsulates Ravinder's playful approach to cuisine, lending traditions, ingredients, and recipes from one culture to another to form what some might call 'immigrant cuisine', all while evoking stories illustrating the relationship between food, culture, place, and identity.




Modern South Asian Kitchen: Recipes and Stories Celebrating Culture and Community – Sabrina Gidda

Winner of the Women's Prize for Fiction, this novel reworks Sophocles' Antigone, exploring themes of love, loyalty and conflicts of identity and politics between two British Muslim families.
